

Solo Exhibition – Michel Tombroff

MERCERIE 70 Rue Van Artevelde – 1000 Brussels

November 16-25, 2023 Vernissage on November 16 from 6 pm to 10 pm



DRIVE is the continuation of the 2022 <u>Suburban Sublime</u> project, an attempt to apprehend the singular event that took place one evening in 1951 when architect and sculptor Tony Smith took an unmarked stretch of the New Jersey Turnpike under construction, somewhere between Manhattan and New Brunswick. It was an experience that shook Smith to the core, so much so that fifteen years later, in 1966, he described it in an interview published by *Artforum*. Here is an extract:

"The drive was a revealing experience. The road and much of the landscape was artificial, and yet it couldn't be called a work of art. On the other hand, it did something for me that art had never done. At first, I didn't know what it was, but its effect was to liberate me from many of the views I had had about art. It seemed that there had been a reality there which had not had any expression in art. [...] There is no way you can frame it, you just have to experience it."

This anecdote, one of the most celebrated in the history of art in the second half of the 20th century, had a profound effect on the artists of the 1960s. Some critics even claimed that it precipitated the transition from the modern to the postmodern, from the modern to the contemporary. *Suburban Sublime* was my first attempt to grasp the significance of this event. Here is the text written by James Voorhies in 2022 (then Director of the Tony Smith Foundation in New York, now curator at the Bass Museum of Art in Miami Beach) at the occasion of that exhibition:

"Brussels-based artist Michel Tombroff explores the legacies of modernism and postmodern art in his work. [...] Tombroff has created a series of three-dimensional paintings drawing on Smith's references to the intersections of art, urban planning, and the sublime, inhabiting the aesthetics of 1960s monochromatic shape paintings by artists such as Frank Stella."

Suburban Sublime was indeed three-dimensional and monochromatic. *DRIVE* extends this research by replacing the third - spatial - dimension with another: color.

<u>Mercerie</u>, the former warehouse of Magasin Absalon located behind Les Halles Saint-Géry in Brussels, an astonishing place for its history, architecture and immense interior volume, offers the ideal environment to approach the conditions of f this singular 1951 event.
